A special feature of the tour is a look at how 3D technology is used to create prosthesis for children in need with a visit to the orthotics and prosthesis laboratory.

Shriners Hospital specializes in treatment of children with orthopedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate. Children are eligible for care and receive all services in a family-centered environment, regardless of the patients' ability to pay.
